

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT (PAST)

From June 2022 to April 2023, I had the pleasure and the privilege of serving as the NWT SPCA's President. During that time, I was fortunate to have met and worked with amazing people, from other Board members to our shelter staff, to folks in communities all over the NWT whose care for animals and devotion to animal welfare brought me to tears on more than one occasion.

We had a lot of ups-and-downs as an organization over the past year. Some of the issues we faced are the same problems that animal welfare organizations nationwide are currently struggling with, including a shortage of veterinarians, shelters and rescue organizations operating at or above capacity, and everything becoming more expensive. But we also faced and tackled several issues that were specific to the NWT SPCA – including infrastructure issues at the shelter and the confusion that came with operating with an entirely new Board of Directors.


We also, however, managed to achieve quite a lot in a short period of time, holding several successful events and hiring the organization's first Executive Director. But what I personally found most rewarding was hearing the countless stories of how this pup or that cat was brought into the shelter struggling, and then found a loving home where they were able to thrive and at the same time bring joy to their new family.

For me, I came into the organization as someone who others would describe as a "cat person", and I left it with two puppies (Kimchi and Moe - see below) who have completely changed my life and 100% for the better. I can't make it ten consecutive minutes around these two without smiling; they are now my whole world.

Kimchi was found all alone in a parking lot at around 8-weeks old on a -40 day by a community member who brought her into the shelter, and Moe is the offspring of one of our Last Litter Program moms. The NWT SPCA shelter staff took both puppies in, loved them, fed them, and then found them each a home with me.

The work this organization does year-after-year spreads happiness like none other that I've come across, and I'm incredibly grateful to have been a part of it.

On behalf of the NWT SCPA's Board of Directors, I am pleased to present the 2022/2023 Annual Report.

Who We Are

NWT SPCA is the largest SPCA in the NWT located in the capital city of Yellowknife. We are a volunteer-based organization striving to protect and enhance the quality of life for all domestic animals in the Northwest Territories. Focusing on the health and wellbeing of all domestic pets, the NWT SPCA runs lifesaving Community Spay/Neuter and Animal Wellness Clinics for companion animals. Education initiatives and pet food drives, adoptions and dog transfers are just a few programs in place to reduce the number of stray and unwanted animals roaming our communities. We are here to help all 33 communities in the NWT and western Nunavut. These programs are improving the welfare of our Northern pets and the communities they live in.

NWT SPCA believes in taking a positive and collaborative approach to saving lives and helping everyone understand and appreciate the value of companion animals in modern society. With determination, ability to learn and adapt to challenges together with our volunteers, staff, and on-the-ground network of partners, we will find every pet a home.

NWT SPCA would like to say a huge thank you to our partners, for without them, we would not be able to accomplish all that we do for the domestic animals in the NWT and Western Nunavut.

Great Slave Animal Hospital has been with us from the beginning when we started in 1988 and continues to work with us in treating all those animals who come to us in need of emergent medical attention, handling the spaying/neutering of animals within our care, and all medical treatments were are not able to provide on our own.

The University of Calgary, has the One Health Initiative, led by Dr. Kutz and her many 4th year veterinary students, which has been providing veterinarian services to the five communities in the Sahtu Region for over 16 years and their results and efforts have proven the success of having these services provided are reflective of our intake numbers from the Sahtu Region, outlined in our Intake Comparative Analysis by Region further on.

Vets Without Borders started their Northern Animal Health Initiative, recognizing remote communities of the north do not have access to veterinary services for prevention of diseases and the increase of dog populations. They continue to partner with us in providing spay/neuter clinics in northern communities. NWT SPCA supplies the necessary medical equipment to make this happen.

Northern Airlines are an important part of our operations, without them we would not be able to assist as many animals as we do. Canadian North Cargo, Air Tindi, Summit Air, and Buffalo have assisted in emergent needs of northern dogs over the last year. Our Dedicated Staff & Volunteers

2022 has been a year of transition and change! The key operational leadership for our shelter was done by a dedicated board of volunteer directors who resigned at the last AGM and stayed on to assist with transition. The previous board was very much a "hands-on" (operational) board and started the process of making the changes to a governance board. A lot of those operational roles transitioned to our full-time staff who willingly took on those roles without hesitation. Those roles included managing adoptions, handling intakes and all the logistics which goes with it,



medical oversight of all animals in our care, coordination of medical and grooming appointments and working with communities – to name a few. Our staff are dedicated, passionate, and devoted to the animals in their care. They have done an amazing job!

We try to help other rescues especially in Alberta where there is an over population of cats. In 2022, 54% of our cats came from Alberta (Drayton and High Level) while 17 % were from Yellowknife and 23% other communities.

Programs & Initiatives

Volunteering



Our organization is built on our volunteers. From our Board of Directors to our everyday supporters they make what we do possible. Volunteers help at the shelter walking dogs, cleaning, hanging out with our cats in their fabulous room and they are also instrumental in making fundraising events possible. All volunteers working in or around the shelter must complete an orientation with our orientation coordinator.

Community Spay and Neuter Program

Under the umbrella of the NWT SPCA Animal Health and Wellness Initiative our organization offers a program for communities outside of Yellowknife to get their pets sterilized and vaccinated. For \$350 a family can send in their dog or cat, and we will get the dog spayed/ neutered, dewormed, and vaccinated. The animal is then sent back to the community.



Foster Program



Foster homes are the difference between surviving and thriving as some animals do not do well in a shelter environment, so we match them with foster homes. Fostering helps to socialize a dog or cat and offer them a stress-free environment to live temporarily. All food, supplies and medical care is provided.

Northern Dog Transfer Network

Every year we give hundreds of dogs a second chance by transporting them out of the communities of the NWT. Some stay here in the Territory, but many are flown out to the southern rescue organizations that can foster and adopt them into great homes. This Network of organizations is an incredible chain of caring groups and



individuals with a passion for saving lives. Without these wonderful people many dogs would not be living their best life.

Northern Pet Food Pantry

Thanks to Food Rescue Yellowknife and local people, donations of pet food and supplies will go to families in the NWT Communities who need a little help with caring for their pets. We donate straw for the warmth and comfort of outdoor dogs in these communities as well. Pet food and supplies are quite costly in Northern Communities, so this program helps with this issue. 100's out pounds of food and straw are provided every year through this program.

Bottle Recycling Initiative

Our recycling program brings in an amazing amount of money to help run our organization. We get bottles and cans from the Mines, the public and other businesses in town. We also have a recycling team that meets regularly to get all the big bags that are donated from the Mines sorted and counted into smaller bags so that we can then



bring them to the Depot. In 2022 we accepted \$8000 from recycling.

Community Animal Health and Wellness Initiative

As part of the NWT SPCA's Strategic Plan our objective is to create safe, healthy communities by building working relationships between our organization and NWT Community Governments. Improving the health of family pets will build stronger human/animal bonds which is so important in the mental and physical lives of northern Canadians. Under the NWT SPCA Animal Health and Wellness Umbrella, in 2022 we were involved in 9 clinics



with Vets Without Borders in Kimmirut, Qikiqtarjuak, Paulatuk, Lutselk'e,Kugluktuk, Gjoa Haven, Fort Liard, Fort Simpson, and Taloyoak 2022.

Community Education and Awareness



Our staff at the shelter are always willing to work with schools and organizations who want to learn more about what we do and how we provide care for the many animals that come to us. We provide a guided tour of the shelter, some time with the animals, and show them how to interact with them and how to care properly for them.

Donations are our highest revenues which shows the generous support of our animal community and all those who care for the welfare of domestic animals across the north. Even though we have struggled like many organizations across the country with high volume of intakes, so many northerners have opened their homes and hearts in **adopting** their forever friend(s).

We were successful in receiving grants in 2022; however, one grant was received in 2022 and recognized in the prior fiscal year. The majority will be deferred into 2023 when the initiatives are fully implemented and are within the grant timelines. Below is a listing of the grants in the order received:

- **City of Yellowknife Core Funding Grant** in the amount of **\$10,000** and was the final payment of a multiyear agreement for 2020 to 2022.
- **CIRNAC Territorial Development Fund** in the amount of **\$49,050** to support our Community Forum Initiative which will take place in 2023.
- **PetSmart Charities Ramp Up Initiative** in the amount of **\$60,000** for medical equipment upgrades and the hiring of an Executive Director, most to be deferred to 2023.
- Animal Alliance of Canada in the amount of \$15,000 (plus anonymous donation of \$7,000) for medical equipment to provide ultrasound diagnostic imaging of all animals in our care.
- Field Law Spay/Neuter Inclusive Program in the amount of \$10,000 which will be implemented in the 2023.

Other revenue consists of Calendar Sales (\$7,950), Memberships (\$5,510), Community Clinic (\$10,000), and Miscellaneous (\$5,580).

Staff Wages represents just over 50% of total expenses and represents of two full-time staff – Shelter Manager and Assistant Manager and fluctuating part-time staff ranging from 6 to 15 employees at any given time. Due to the high turnover rate in part-time staff and the impact this had on our two full-time employees, the Board did a wage review across the country and increased the part-time rate from \$16 per hour to \$20 per hour, which came into effect on April 1, 2023.







Animal Medical Expenses is the second largest expenditure which consists of surgical costs for spaying and neutering, vaccines, and emergency services for all animals within our care.

Shelter Repairs & Maintenance is the third largest expenditure. In the fall we had a major failure of our septic tank and the response from local businesses was amazing, as we all know this is the busiest time of the year for those in construction before winter sets in. This expense amounted to \pm \$27,000 even though everyone did their best with keeping costs as low as possible.


